Brownfields remediation and redevelopment is critical to protecting and restoring the environment and public health, and to reinvigorating the regional economy.

Qualifications. NKU's Center for Applied Ecology provides professional, science-based environmental services to the local community while offering practical work experience to NKU students. The Center's primary contribution to the program will be the participation of Scott Fennell, PE. Scott has over 20 years professional experience in brownfields identification, assessment, and remediation, having served as the principal engineer and project manager on 37 brownfields sites in 11 states. Scott served as the principal investigator developing a GIS inventory of potential brownfields in the City of Covington and Kenton County. Scott is a Certified Professional in the Ohio EPA Voluntary Action Program, and is a licensed professional engineer in Kentucky.

Contributions to the Initiative. Scott will contribute to the project by serving on the Partners' Committee. In this capacity, he will provide advice to ensure resources are expended in the most useful and economical way, while achieving the necessary degree of technical quality, to accomplish as much work as practicable with the available funding. For example, Scott can evaluate competing consultants' proposals to ensure that efforts are focused and effective relative to numbers and types of environmental samples, chemical analyses, QA/QC, human health and environmental risk assessments, and remedial actions. Scot and/or other CAE professional staff can also provide consultation as to redevelopment landuse, particularly relative to potential for restoration as a natural area / greenspace.

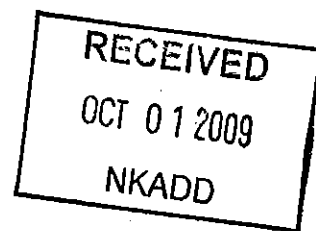

VISION 2015 is a non-profit 501(c)(3) partner in the application for an EPA Brownfield Assessment Grant. The concept of a Licking River Greenway is one of many initiatives to improve the economy and quality of life in Northern Kentucky that were generated by community residents and leaders under the guidance of Vision 2015 in a long range planning exercise. More than 2000 citizens participated in the process that concluded that the quality of a community's parks and recreation system is a key indicator of the overall quality of life of a community and is critical to the region's future.

The Licking River valley soon became the focus of this regional parks initiative. Funds were raised from public and private sector sources to engage local engineering and landscape architectural firms in the development of a Master Plan for the river valley. Vision 2015 led a civic engagement process to assure that the plan included the ideas and priorities of local residents and had broad support from businesses, civic organizations, and local governments.

The Licking River Greenway and Trails study area encompasses the corridor from the confluence with the Ohio River to I-275 and the adjoining communities of Covington, Taylor Mill, Newport and Wilder, Kentucky. The report takes into account related planning efforts, planned development, cultural and historical resources, eco-structure and infrastructure along the Greenway. Representatives from the Sanitation District, the Water District, the Conservation Districts, the Port Authority, the Area Planning Commission and local governments joined leaders from the adjacent neighborhoods, property owners, civic associations, and business organizations to prepare the Master Plan.

Now we are working together to implement the Plan. The Fiscal Courts and the City Commissions and staffs meet with us on a regular basis to assure that the next

steps are taken. The application for a Brownfield Assessment Grant is both an indication of this strong partnership and an outcome of the collaboration. The river valley has been home to many industries in the past. Environmentally impaired sites must be identified and addressed if the Greenway is to become an attractive and healthy site for recreational uses. The clean-up and redevelopment of the Licking River valley is a top priority of the Greenway coalition and Vision 2015.



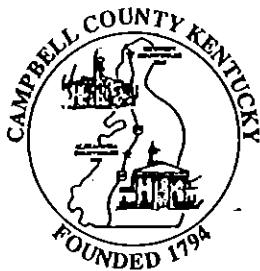

Re: Letter of Partnership/Support for the City's U.S. EPA Grant Applications

Dear Mr. Norman:

The Center for Great Neighborhoods of Covington is pleased to partner with the City of Covington, the Campbell County Fiscal Court, and the Northern Kentucky Area Development District (NKADD) on an application for a one million dollar Brownfields Assessment Grant through the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The purpose of this coalition assessment grant is to identify and assess brownfields and plan for the remediation and redevelopment of potentially contaminated sites. The focus area of the coalition grant is the Licking Ricker Greenway and is consistent with Vision 2015's Greenway Master Plan to increase economic and recreational utilization of the Licking River in a sustainable manner. This assessment grant is our first step in obtaining funds for clean-up of identified sites.

As a not-for-profit community development corporation, the Center for Great Neighborhoods of Covington works with neighborhood associations throughout Covington. I will be working with the Coalition and representing the Center on the Partners Committee that will oversee the project. In this role, I will guide the Center in assisting with public outreach activities in coordination with the Coalition, including facilitating public meetings and roundtable discussions about the program, providing the community with valuable information on the project, helping identify and prioritize properties, and encouraging private property owners to participate in the program.

The Center enthusiastically supports this application for brownfields assessment funds for several reasons. First, the Center works directly with several neighborhood associations that abut the Licking River. These resident-led groups have identified the development of the Licking River Greenway as a priority, and are very excited about the walking/bicycling trails and other amenities that will be made possible via its development. Moreover, brownfield redevelopment removes blight from our urban neighborhoods. Blighting influences such as vacant lots and abandoned industrial buildings attract trash, graffiti, and crime; reduce property values; discourage homeownership; and otherwise delay neighborhood revitalization. In partnership with the City of Covington and Austinburg Neighborhood Association, the Center has constructed new and rehabilitated existing homes in Covington's Austinburg neighborhood, which abuts the Licking River. Our new homeowners are thrilled about the Licking River Greenway Plan! Finally, brownfield redevelopment promotes the reuse of land in the urban core of Covington, bringing additional employment opportunities, tax revenue, and economic vitality to our city.

We are delighted to be a part of this important environmental and economic initiative in the Northern Kentucky. We hope that EPA will look favorably upon this Coalition Brownfield Assessment application. This grant will provide a valuable tool to achieve our goals of healthy and vibrant revitalization of brownfields and lead the way for implementation of the Licking River Greenway Plan.



It is with great pleasure and enthusiasm that I write supporting the efforts of the City of Covington, the Campbell County Fiscal Court and the Northern Kentucky Area Development District's efforts to secure funding for a Brownfield's Assessment Grant. The Assessment funds will facilitate the inventorying, characterization, assessment and cleanup of sites in the Licking Valley Greenway. The Licking River is adjacent to the one of the Housing Authority's family sites, Jacob Price Homes. This site is currently undergoing a phased redevelopment and is the focus of a HOPE VI Grant that will be submitted in November of this year.

The Conceptual Development Plan calls for new construction on the Jacob Price site and the renovation of off-site parcels. A major focus of the plan is utilizing the Licking River Greenway as a recreational amenity and a creative solution to storm water retention.

Concepts for on-site development include the following:

- Lynn Street is extended through the Jacob Price site. This reflects what is reported to be the original street pattern of the neighborhood prior to the construction of Jacob Price Homes, and will thereby "reconnect" the site with the neighborhood
- The site plan includes some 12,000 square feet of open space designated as "green infrastructure". These are sites that will be specially designed to provide enhanced storm water infiltration
- The plan presently includes 8 senior cottages, 77 two-story townhouse units, and 12 live-work units located on Greenup Street. The live-work units will provide the opportunity for a reasonable amount of neighborhood-serving commercial uses (9,600 sf +/-), and potential economic opportunities for residents to develop new businesses. The architectural style of the residences will be compatible with the character of adjacent residential buildings.

Concepts for off-site development include the following:

- Development of a trail system along the Licking River – with "trail-head" access at extended street ends at Ninth Street, 10th Street, Robbins, and 11th Street. Shared
