### **Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission Celebrates 35<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** *Agency commemorates environmental protection successes*

**FRANKFORT, Ky. (Sept. 8, 2011)** – The Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission (KSNPC) is marking 35 years of carrying out its environmental mission to protect Kentucky’s natural heritage.

The commission marked its anniversary today with a celebration in the Capitol Rotunda. Attending the event were Hank List, deputy secretary of the Energy and Environment Cabinet, Tom Fitzgerald, director of the Kentucky Resources Council, Dr. William H. Martin, chair of the Heritage Land Conservation Fund, Carl Breeding, chair of the Kentucky State Nature Preserves Commission and Sen. Julian Carroll, former governor of Kentucky

On June 19, 1976, Gov. Carroll signed legislation authored by the late Jon E. Rickert of Elizabethtown establishing the commission. Since 1976, the commission has created a nature preserve system that protects Kentucky’s best, most intact natural areas.

“The work of the commission has had a tremendous positive impact on our state,” said Don Dott, executive director of KSNPC. “From the Blanton Forest near the Virginia border to Three Ponds on the banks of the Mississippi River, 60 state nature preserves cover more than 25,000 acres of Kentucky’s natural heritage.

“To locate the best lands for preserves, the commission’s field biologists have cataloged more than 12,000 records in the most complete and accurate inventory of rare species, natural communities and conserved lands in Kentucky,” Dott said.

Many of the preserves KSNPC works so hard to obtain and protect are open to the public for hiking and wildlife observation. Whether the public is looking for a casual nature walk or a vigorous hike, the trails at these public preserves offer a variety of choices. On occasion, staff biologists, ecologists and botanists lead guided hikes into selected preserves that lack public facilities. These guided hikes are usually held in the spring, when vast arrays of wildflowers are at the peak of their splendor.

Twice a year, KSNPC produces an e-mail newsletter, “Naturally Kentucky.” Readers will find articles written by the staff describing activities, discoveries and projects of the commission. Dates and places for guided hikes and volunteer opportunities are listed in the newsletter, as well as in-depth environmental issues and vivid pictures.
