




Strawman Proposal and Concepts



Some Clarity

- This proposal was not the final report. The proposal had a lot in it to help spur discussion.
- Some comments received were related to organization of the document but we will discuss the reorganization of the proposal towards the end of the working meeting
- We are only authorized to make recommendations within the scope defined by the legislation – comments outside of the scope of our jurisdiction will be documented but not included as final recommendations



Strawman Proposal



Some Major Themes

- Focus of Strawman Proposal as laid out by SJR79
- Reorganization of the Strawman Proposal
- Clarity on the barriers and opportunities
 - Organization and Pacing of opportunities
 - What opportunities need a trigger event?
- Structure of Permanent Organization
- Too much emphasis on economic development?
- Confusion around community engagement
 - How to ensure proactive community engagement organization complements federal community engagement requirements
- Clarifying responsibility for public safety



Strawman Proposal



Developing the Mission Statement of the Commission

- Framing questions to help shape the Mission Statement of the Commission
 - What short- and mid-term goals are reasonable?
 - What long-term goals are reasonable?
 - What role can the commission play in fostering the development of nuclear energy industry in the Commonwealth



Short-Term Goals (~1-2 years)

- •Some comments that we received:
 - Enabling nuclear energy siting through an Early Site Permit?
 - Building organizational capacity to support nuclear energy deployment?
 - How to proceed with proactive community engagement?
 - Clarifying the role of Paducah and other existing federal sites in Kentucky in nuclear energy development?
 - Understanding the range of state financial incentives applicable to nuclear energy development
 - Other comments?
- •What are the commission's short-term goals, taking into account TEAM these comments?

Mid-to-Long Term Goals (~3+ years)

•Some comments that we received:

- Workforce development is a long-term project
- Greater certainty around the regulatory processes associated for nuclear
 - What does a CPCN for a nuclear project look like?
 - What would be the implications of a merchant nuclear facility?
 - What about a behind the meter microreactor?
 - Utilization of CWIP
- Financial support for nuclear energy projects
- Public confidence in nuclear energy
- Attracting projects investments in KY
- Providing opportunities across the Commonwealth
- Other comments?
- •What are the commission's long-term goals, taking into account these comments?



"The Role the Commission Can Play in Fostering the Development of the Nuclear Power Industry in the Commonwealth" (Slide 1 of 2)

- Some comments that we received:
 - The scope of the economic development activities at the Commission?
 - This organization will be a non-regulatory organization.
 - The role: don't duplicate Research and Development efforts that already happen in Kentucky (CAER)
 - Education and training: Should the Commission be responsible for education and training? Or just be a facilitator?
 - Should formal training take an "all of the above approach" and not focus on nuclear-specific training?
 - What should the pacing be given the uncertainty?



"The Role the Commission Can Play in Fostering the Development of the Nuclear Power Industry in the Commonwealth" (Slide 2 of 2)

- Some comments that we received (continued):
 - Community engagement and transparency
 - The public have typically had the opportunity to engage nuclear permitting through the NRC licensing process, but should there be a non-regulatory way to engage communities, and to what extent?
 - At what time should we begin engaging communities?
 - Should there be a priority to engage "energy communities" first?
 - Other comments?
 - Becoming a trusted resource in nuclear energy development
 - What are your suggestions?

What role should the commission play, taking into account these comments

Draft Mission Statement

"The mission of the Nuclear Energy Development Commission is to be the non-regulatory trusted agency on nuclear energy issues in the Commonwealth and to support the development of the nuclear energy ecosystem across the Commonwealth in a collaborative manner that enhances Kentucky's economy, offers benefits for all Kentuckians, including safety and environmental protection, and supports community voices"

Structure of Permanent Organization (Slide 1 of 2)

- Do you agree with a structure that is an Executive Director and a Board?
 - If so, what should be the makeup of the board?
 - Should we even recommend a very specific organization or be broad about who should be represented on the board?
 - Should the board be comprised of:
 - State Government
 - Local Government (different than an energy community representative)
 - Manufacturing
 - Utilities
 - Environmental NGOs
 - Nuclear Industry Ecosystem
 - Citizen
 - Energy Community representative



Structure of Permanent Organization (Slide 2 of 2)

- Placement of the Commission (within Government)
 - Administratively attached to Economic Development Cabinet?
- Staffing Needs?
 - How much "nuclear experience" would an Executive Director need? Or should the credentials of the ED be business focused?
- Funding?
 - Note: If state funds are appropriated, this organization would not be able to lobby



Duties of the Permanent Organization

Adopt by laws and regulations for the management and operation in order to carry out the Mission of the Commission

Develop and adopt a strategic plan for carrying out the purposes of the Commission

Develop and update annually a Nuclear Energy Economic impact analysis for the Commonwealth,

Develop an annual summary of its activities and achievements

Develop Recommendations for the support and expansion of the nuclear energy ecosystem in Kentucky to the Governor and the Chairmen of the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations and Revenue, and the Chairmen of the House and Senate Committees on Natural Resources and Energy and on Economic Development and Workforce
