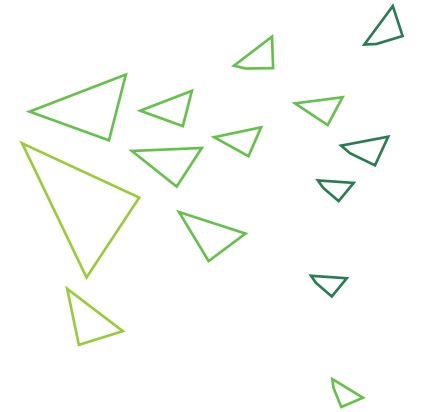

A history of service

For more than 3 decades the Kentucky Division of Abandoned Mine Lands has been mitigating mine hazards threatening citizens and their homes across the coalfields.



AML is 100% federally funded

Coal operators pay a tonnage extraction fee to the federal government which goes into the AML Trust Fund. A portion of that funding is distributed, annually, to states and Tribes.

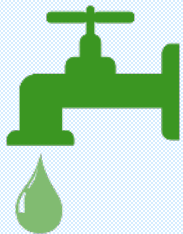

 - Over 220 Million dollars in grant funds
- Each year grant year AML has received no less than 40 applications for the AMLER program
- Applications are processed by AML, then winners are selected by the EEC Cabinet Secretary
- Selected Applications must go through a **Vetting Process**
- Join in an **MOA** with the Cabinet
- Have a **NEPA** study conducted on the site
- Received **ATP**



Important Terms

AML Nexus – A required characteristic of AML relatedness for applications to be deemed eligible for selection.

- Unreclaimed Priority 1, 2, or 3 sites listed in eAMLIS.

- Previously reclaimed AML lands and polluted waters.
- Land adjacent to unreclaimed or previously reclaimed AML lands and polluted waters as justified by the State, Tribe, and/or the communities impacted by historic coal production.
- Currently permitted Title V mine sites are not eligible to receive AMLER funds.

Vetting – A conceptual review of a AMLER Project proposal.

- Conducted by AML
- The first step in the process of approval of a selected application

MOA– Memorandum of Agreement established as a part of the grant process

- Between the Cabinet for Energy and Environment and the Grantee
- Delineates the terms of the project
- Establishes the timeframe for expenditures
- Signals the beginning of the design phase of a vetted grant.



Important Terms

NEPA – National Environmental Policy Act signed into law in 1970.

- Conducted by AML
- Establishes a basic framework for environmental protection in the United States
- Ensures that federal agencies consider environmental concerns equally with technical, social and economic concerns.
- Enhances public participation in government planning and decision making
- Required for the expenditure of AMLER Funds

EA – Environmental Assessment

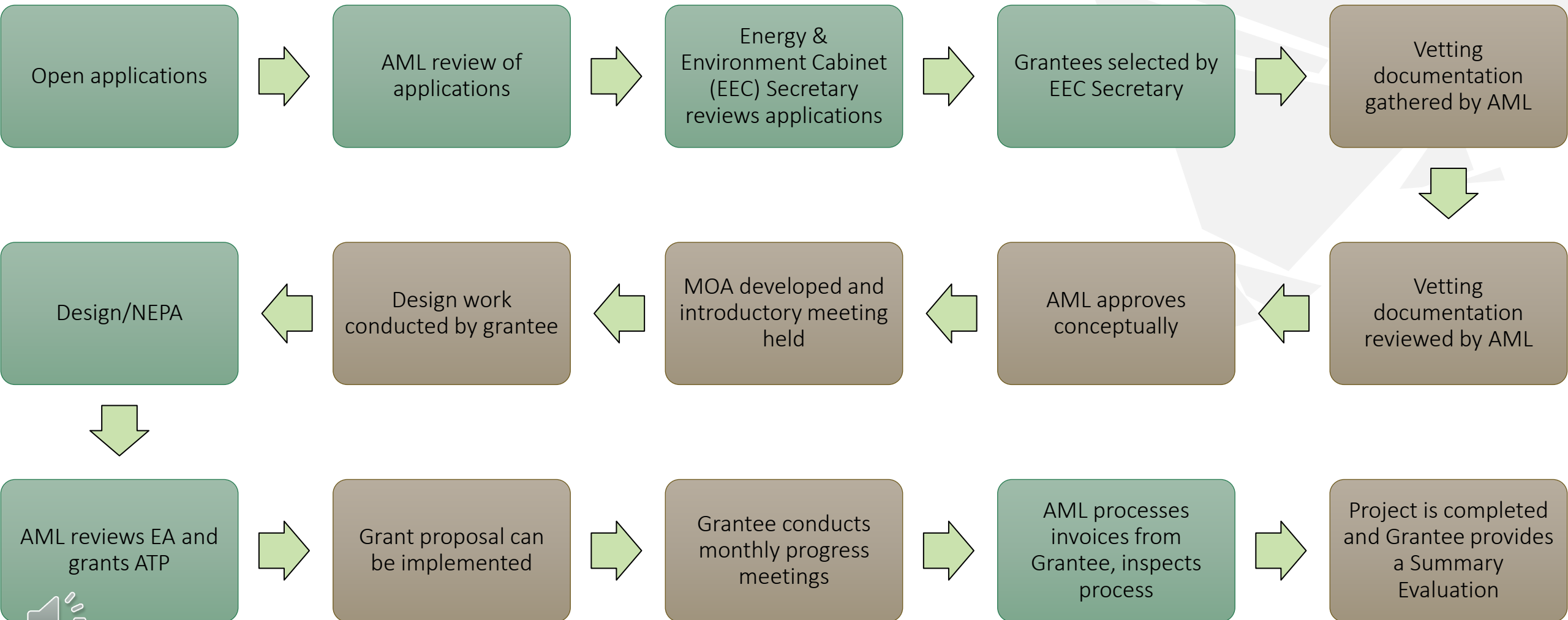
- Document detailing all potential environmental impacts of the project
- Created by AML

ATP – Authorization To Proceed

- The final hurdle to surpass prior to actual implementation or construction of an AMLER Grant
- Issued by AML
- Similar to vetting, only more detailed

Expectations: Grantees, Project Administrators, & Contractors.

- Submit a completed application by May 12, 2025.
- Procure all contracts according to state and local laws and regulations. (KRS45A)
- Review all contracts, bid documents, RFPs and RFQs for completeness and submit to AML for review and concurrence.
- Verify that all entities associated with the project obtain the proper state and local permits required.
- Submit mandatory monthly BABA, budget and progress reports, monthly site inspection reports, and hold regular monthly progress meetings to which AML staff will attend. (per MOA)
- Attend all meetings related to the bidding process, contract award process, and project activity status.
- Submit a final report within 30 days of project completion and an annual report for 10 years starting one year from the MOA execution.

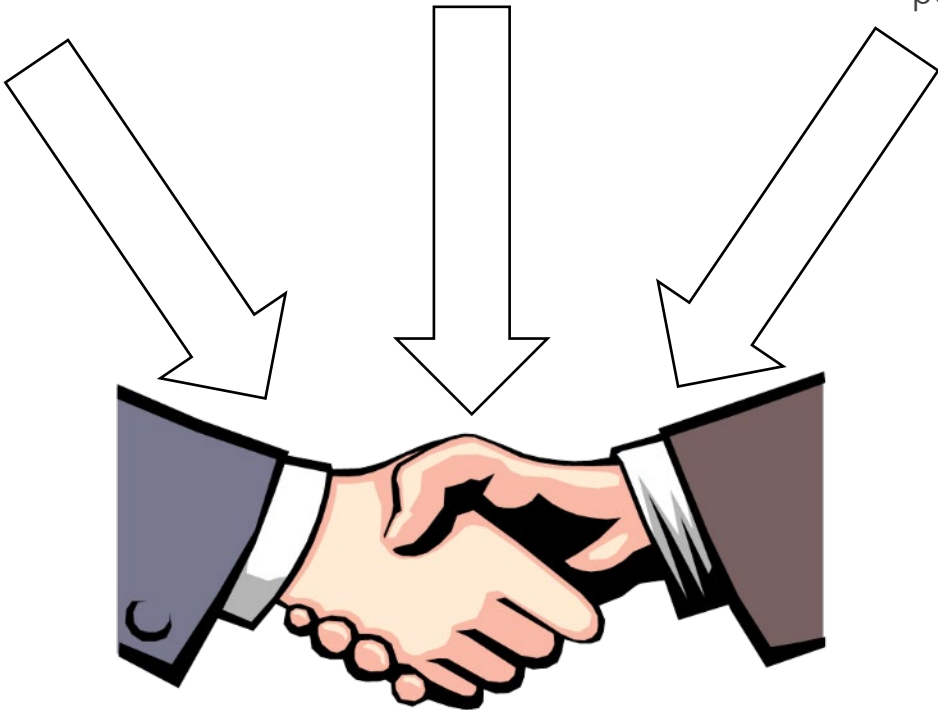

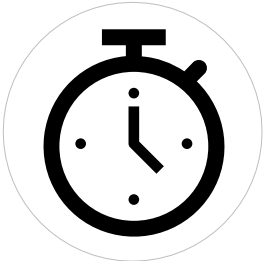

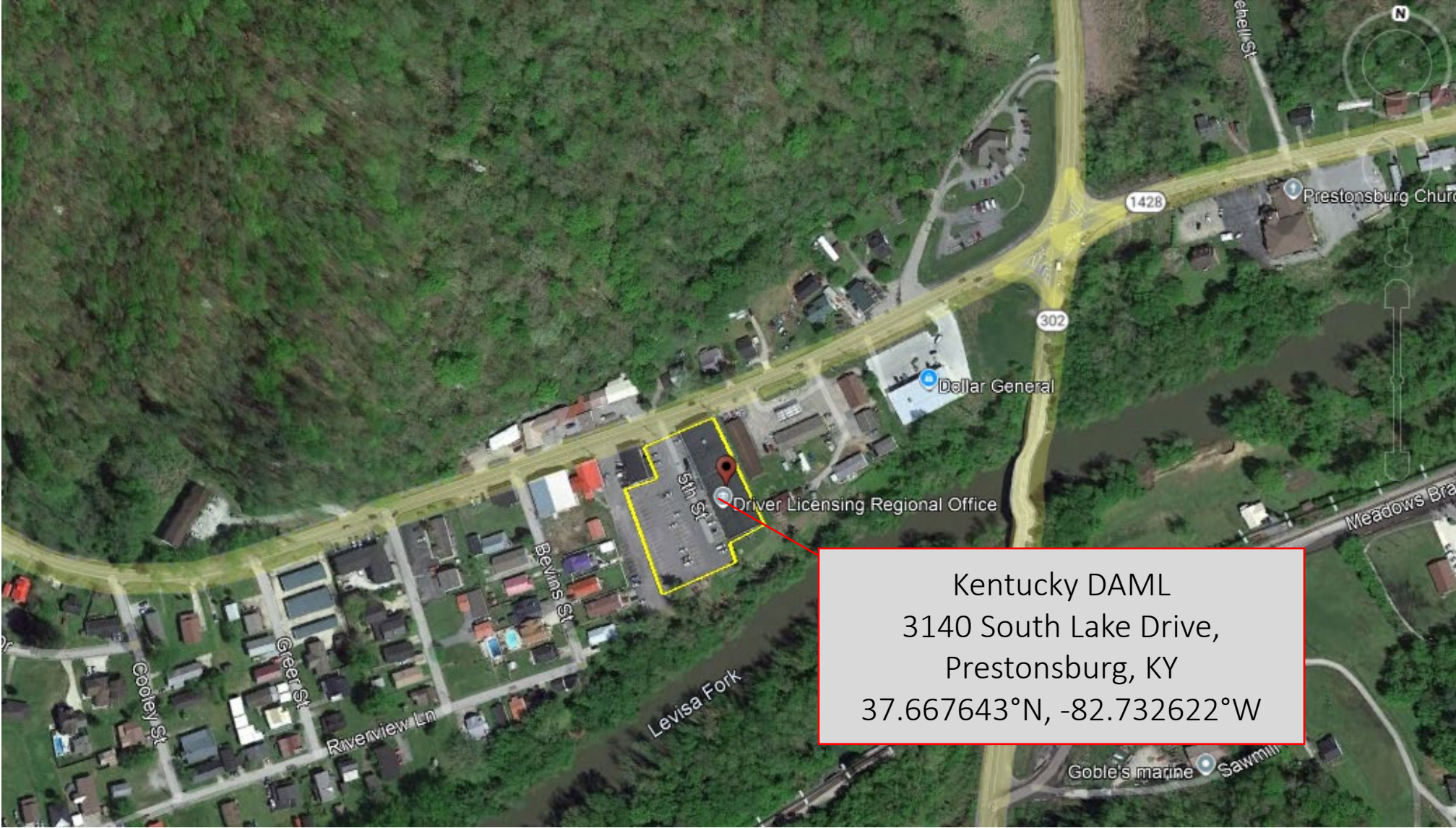

Map Example



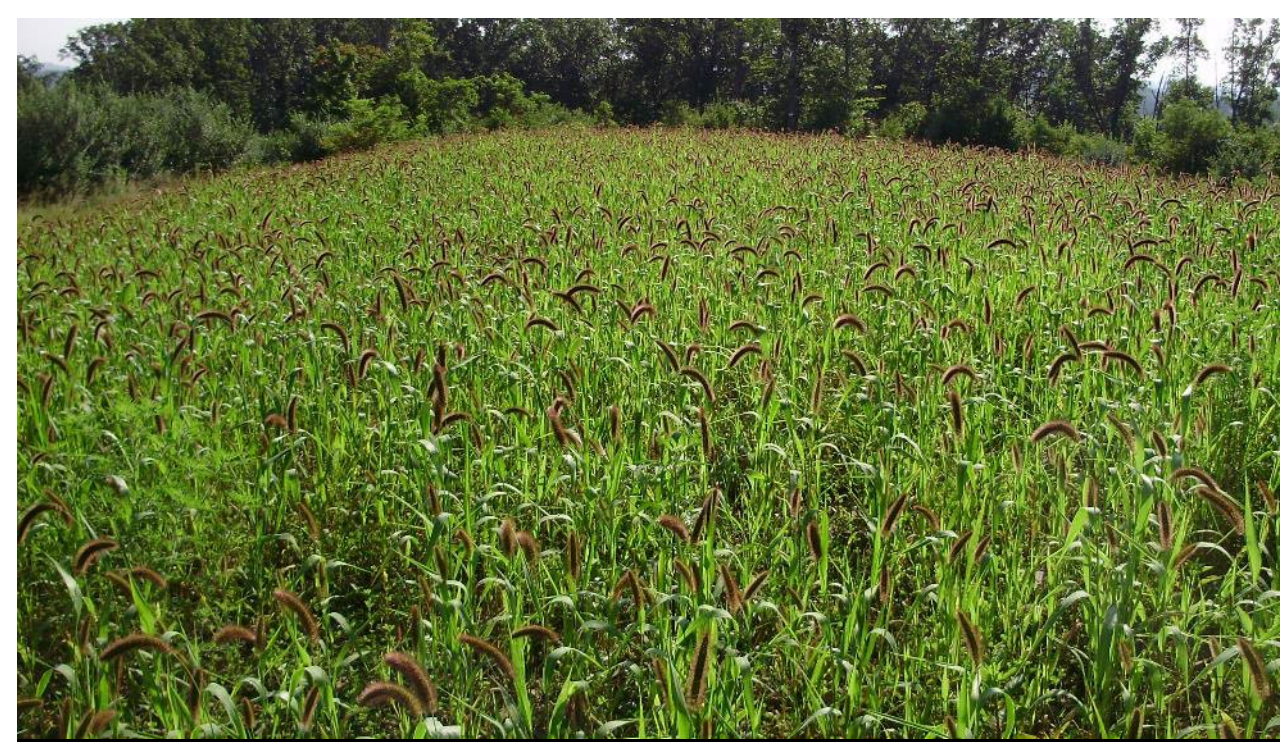
